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Public Comments:

19 Trisha Bridgeo: 20

Brought forward a concern regarding the intersection of Old Fremont Road, Fremont Road and Route 102. Large tractor trailer trucks taking the wrong turn and backing and turning around in a dangerous area; concerned about an accident waiting to happen. Please consider putting up signs to direct them to the Walmart Distribution Center. Mr. Ilsley stated he would bring it before the Highway Safety Committee and work with Walmart to work through a solution.

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Kelly Lehman:

Came forward to get clarity on how the town publishes and notifies residents of changes in rules and regulations. Mr. Ilsley answered her question.

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32 Agenda:

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Ethics Training:

Ethics Chair Gretchen Gott and Ethics Member Tracy Merrill came before the Board of Selectmen to present Ethics Training to the Board members.

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Bean Tavern Historic District Commission Recommendation: Combined with next agenda item.

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Bean Tavern/Trustee Request Update:

The Board received a letter dated 6/30/21 from the Trustees of the Trust Funds regarding the CRF Request put forward at the last Board meeting. The Board recommended that they get feedback from the Trustees before moving forward.

The Trustees of the Trust Funds met on 6/29/21 to review CRF 2021-11 for \$1,125.00 from the CRF fund created by the 2020 warrant article #34 "To establish a CRF for the purchase of 10 Old Fremont Road (the Bean Tavern). The Trustees voted unanimously that this request to abate rodents from the property does not meet the state purpose of the warrant article approved by the voters. The purchase of Old Fremont Road. The request submitted is for pest control services and does not pertain to the purchase of the property. Signed by the Chair of the Trustees, Kevin Woods. Mr. Ilsley stated that he concurs with the decision of the Trustees. These funds will be taken out of the GGB budget line to cover the costs and the funds not expended will be put in the unassigned fund balance and will lapse. He further stated that the CRF can be redefined so it can be utilized or eliminate it through a warrant article.

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Utility Abatement Update:

- 55 Mr. Ilsley was asked to follow up on the utility abatement and get clarification from George Sansoucy's 56 letter from the last Board meeting (7-24-21). He read a statement/Email dated 7-1-21 from George 57 Sansoucy:
- We recommend that the Town deny this abatement until they can provide the methodology of which they believe the value should be calculated.
- For the abatement filed by Consolidated Communications f/k/a FairPoint, the company is requesting a reduction in value of the use of the public right of way and has provided no support or documentation to justify a change in methodology, the factual basis for the request or support for its methods of calculating the use of the public right of way. We will be communicating with Consolidated Communications during the 2021 valuation season regarding these deficiencies and hopes of resolving this and many other appeals on the same matter in other communities. The poles and conduits are valued based on the current New Hampshire state law and don't appear to be in dispute by Consolidated Communications.

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Police Department Technologies Update:

- Chief Labell presented a memo dated 6/30/21 to the Town Manager stating the following update:
- Pursuant to your request for the July 12, 2021, Board of Selectmen's meeting, the following is an update on the status of the 2020/2021 PD technology projects:
- Body-Worn Camera's (BWC's): In tracking HB253, which would require law enforcement officers to use body-worn camera's and establish a grant program to assist local law enforcement agencies to purchase body-worn camera's, the last action was on March 9, 2021, at the House level and is currently "retained in committee."
- Idemia liveScan Finger Printing Machine: As you know the State of New Hampshire, Department of Safety released a letter on April 14, 2021, informing all police chiefs that they are seeking grant funding to expand their LiveScan inventory to distribute to local law enforcement agencies as part of a loaner program. I have submitted our agency to the list for consideration. It is my understanding that there may be up to 20 machines that the state can distribute if the grant funding is approved. I am not sure where RPO is/will be on the list or how machine placement will be determined. I received an update on June 28, 2021, that the state will not have notification of the grant award until
- 83 September/October 2021.
 - In understanding the importance of being fiscally responsible it is also important to note that these projects are important to the police department and in many ways represent the future of law enforcement tactics and equipment. It is my belief that there is no better tool in providing transparency and liability protection to a community and its police department than BWC's. Please let me know if you or the Board of Selectmen have any further questions or require any additional information.
- Selectman Long made a motion to accept the Police Chief's recommendations, seconded by Selectman Weldy, MOTION CARRIED, 5-0-0.

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Emergency Management Working Group (EMWG) – NHDOT Bridge Preservation Recommendations to Board:

- Mr. Ilsley was tasked to take the concerns for the NHDOT preservation project to the Emergency Management Working Group for their review and address any emergency concerns prior to this project starting. He read the statement from the Emergency Management Working Group (EMWG):
- The Emergency Management Working Group met to discuss the proposed bridge maintenance work by the State Department of Transportation on the Rt 27 bridges [2 in Candia 1 in Raymond]. With both Police and Fire in attendance, the discussion of emergency response and mutual aid did occur. Following a through discussion the assembled Department Heads agreed that the closure of the Bridges in Candia to reduce the duration of construction would not significantly impact emergency response. Closure would reduce cost to the State and reduce the duration of construction from 10 weeks down to 5 weeks. The State has not provided a proposal to close the Raymond Bridge. Their proposed schedule indicates that

traffic will be accommodated by establishing one way alternating traffic for 4 weeks followed by 4 weeks of two-lane traffic flow. Impacts to school buses was discussed and determined to be minimal as the proposed work schedule is targeted as summer of 2022. Feedback to the State of NH might include a recommendation that work commence after school is out for the summer. Impacts to pedestrians and bicycle traffic was discussed and determined to be very light along this stretch of highway. With proper signage, pedestrian and bicycle traffic could be re-routed over the Dudley Road bridge while the Raymond bridge was being rehabilitated. There are no other issues or concerns noted. The Municipal Work Zone Agreement was read aloud and discussed. It is clear that NHDOT will take responsibility for the construction and the related traffic management and that upon execution the Town will affirm that the State is in full control of these aspects of the work. The Agreement further indicates that any local Police Officers used to facilitate traffic management will not be compensated unless they have successfully completed the NHDOT approved training course. Our Officers have been so trained and therefore we would be eligible for compensation if we were called to provide services.

Cemetery Draft Charter (Amy Pettengill/Town Manager):

Mr. Ilsley and Amy Pettengill worked collaboratively to create a draft Cemetery Advisory Committee Charter Working Document to present to the Board based on the feedback and concerns at the Board meeting on 7/24/21. Mr. Ilsley read the draft charter with options so that the Board could choose their direction to go forward.

- 1) Act as advisors to support the Town Manager statutory responsibilities regarding public cemeteries and bridge the gap until Cemetery Trustees are re-established
- As an advisory committee the CAC does not, oversee staff, obligate funds, alter policy and procedures. However, it may formulate recommendations to the office or body with authority to act
- 3) Conduct and assessment of identified task and build a projected timeline for the completion of all CAC Charges
- 4) Lead both research and administrative efforts to re-establish Cemetery Trustees; and prepare strategies for Board of Selectmen approval
- 5) Review and make recommendations for updated Cemetery Policies for Board of Selectmen approval
- 6) Evaluate, determine, and prepare recommendations to the Town Manager for the prioritization of short-term, mid-term and long-term capital needs along with projected funding needs
- 7) Evaluate cemetery near and long-term funding needs against current revenue and make recommendations to Town Manager for plot fees schedule and make ready for Board of Selectmen or Legislative Body Approval
- 8) Evaluate and prepare Request for Proposals for approved cemetery service contracts
- Be the primary office of responsibility for all public outreach and communications regarding cemetery activities and information
- 10) Create an in-person forum for citizens to present recommendations, express concerns or offer support municipal cemetery efforts and make corrective action recommendations

Proposed Membership

Charter Part 1: Selecting Committee Membership Options: It is recommended that the Committee be comprised of at a minimum statutory member from the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board and the Historic District Commission (Town Officials) as well as members from the community (Members at Large). It is also encouraged that the quorum for this body be established as an odd number. Below outlines recommended membership concepts and structures:

Option C; Seven (7) Member Committee Three (3) Town Officials with alternates and four (4) Members at Large. This option maintains the recommended core membership of Town Officials and expands the community input to represent a majority of the Committee:

Option A Charter Narrative: The Cemetery Advisory Committee will be a **Seven (7)** member Committee with membership composed from a primary and alternate from the Raymond Board of Selectmen, Raymond Planning Board, and the Raymond Historical District Commission. In addition, the Raymond Board of Selectmen will appoint **Four (4)** members at large from the community.

Selectman Weldy made a recommendation/motion to the Board to choose option "C", seconded by Chairman Plante, MOTION CARRIED 4-0-1 (Selectman Long recused himself from the vote). The town will now advertise for members at large and bring back appointments to the Board at a future meeting.

Approval of Deputy Town Clerk/Tax Collector:

Christina McCarthy, Tax Collector came forward to present the recommendation from herself and the Town Clerk, Alyssa Richard for their choice of a Deputy to the Town Clerk and the Tax Collector. Their recommendation was Christine Rousseau. Vice Chair Hoelzel motioned to appoint Christine Rousseau as the Deputy Town Clerk, seconded by Selectman Long, MOTION CARRIED 4-0-1 (Selectman Campbell recused himself from the vote). Vice Chair Hoelzel motioned to appoint Christine Rousseau as the Deputy Tax Collector, seconded by Selectman Weldy, MOTION CARRIED 4-0-1 (Selectman Campbell recused himself from the vote).

Appointment of Commissioners to Rockingham Planning Commission RPC:

Christina McCarthy, Planning Technician came before the Board to ask permission to appoint commissioners to the Rockingham Planning Commission. The Planning Board voted and approved Patricia Bridgeo from the Planning Board and a staff member Christina McCarthy, Planning Technician. Chairman Plante made a motion to appoint the recommended commissioner appointees to the RPC, seconded by seconded by Vice Chair Hoelzel, MOTION CARRIED 4-0-1 (Selectman Campbell recused himself from the vote).

Board Correspondence sent/received:

Cemetery Plot: The Board was presented with a cemetery plot document, signed by Board members.

Land Use Form: Mr. Ilsley received a request from a resident Adam Kelly to bait on Town Property (Cassier Forest) for baiting. The resident sent in a land use form. His letter was read. This property is already listed as a hunting property. The Conservation Commission was approached and sent the request over to the Board. Selectman Weldy asked if the Conservation Commission sent in writing their recommendation to

the Board. No written recommendation was submitted. RSA 207:3d pursuant to RSA 541-A were read. Chairman Plante made a motion that we allow Adam Kelly to bait on the property for hunting purposes for one year only. He would have to come back annually to continue this process, seconded for the purpose of discussion by Vice Chair Hoelzel; Selectman Weldy had reservations of allowing baiting on that property without written recommendations from the Conservation Commission who oversees that property with BearPaw; Chairman Plante pulled his motion. Selectman Weldy made a motion that we defer to the Conservation Commission for the baiting request with follow up from the Conservation Commission, seconded by Selectman Long, MOTION CARRIED 5-0-0.

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Citizens Answers/Questions and Comments:

Trisha Bridgeo stated that she has been hosting meetings at her residents and gathering resident concerns to bring before the Board; She will formally send a letter requesting to be on a future agenda. Gretchen Gott asked about other Boards and if they are active.

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Town Manager's Report:

Mr. Ilsley gave a report on the continued rain and the effect on the culverts; we are monitoring culverts for potential issues. If anyone sees any over the road flooding or sink holes in the road, please contact dispatch who will contact our Highway Department. All the reconstructed culverts are holding up well, but the increased volume of rain has placed stress on existing older culverts with greater potential for flooding. Shattigee Road Culvert has failed and is closed to traffic. We have engineers working with us to help with this effort. West Shore Drive culvert is still operational and is being monitored for potential flooding; we have established an agreement with the Governor's Lake Association to assist in using private boats to ferry people in in the event of an emergency if access to the road is cut off due to flooding or culvert failure. Eventually that road will have to be reconstructed. Bean Tavern Pest Update: there were some rodents caught mostly in the kitchen area and other areas of the house. There is burrowing along the foundation. They will keep the live baits for one month then we will go forward with the demolition. 4th of July Celebration: Went off very well. He read a list of employees who volunteered their time for this event and donated their time without compensation: Chad Shevlin, Mike Labell, Deborah Intonti, Sharon Baker, Julie Jenks, Kevin Hammond, Harry Walker, Jr., Jason Grant, Jonathan Wood for a total of 35.5 hours with a dollar value of \$1,504.28. Vice Chairman Hoelzel made a motion to accept the donation from employees in the amount of 35.5 hours/\$1,504.28, seconded by Chairman Plante, MOTION CARRIED 5-0-0. Police Radar Sign/Speed Trailer: This was vandalized over the weekend on Long Hill Road. The costs to purchase this equipment was valued at approximately \$10,000. It will need to be replaced. If anyone saw anything, please contact the police department at 895-4747. This claim will be sent up to Primex Insurance for replacement.

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Board of Selectmen Report:

Selectman Long, no report, Selectman Weldy, no report, Selectman Campbell, no report, Chairman Plante thanked everyone who contributed to the 4th of July celebration, town fair; Vice Chair Hoelzel brought the Boston Post Cane plaque to the meeting to present to the Town. She thanked Kim Prince for doing the research for all of the Boston Post Cane recipients. It will be hung in the Town Office.

Non-Public: RSA 91A:3, II (a) Personnel: Selectman Long made a motion to enter into non-public session, seconded by Chairman Plante, the Board was polled, Hoelzel Y, Plante Y, Campbell Y, Weldy, Y, Long Y and the Board will only return to adjourn. Non-public Session began at 8:05 p.m. The public session reconvened at 10:15 p.m. Selectman Campbell left at 10:10 p.m. The Chairman stated that the nonpublic minutes will be sealed for 4 years, July 12, 2025. No other board business was conducted.

Dragon Mosquito Control, Inc. Monthly Update June 2021

JUL 132021

Initial: 3

One year ago, we were experiencing a moderate drought. Today, we're currently in better shape. Lawns are green, gardens are growing and backyard containers are full of water, which is perfect for mosquitoes. Continue to dump out standing water in your yard to reduce mosquito numbers and the risk of mosquito-borne illnesses.

In June, Dragon crews have:

- Monitored catch basins for larval mosquito activity
- Treated catch basins with an organic insecticide to control disease carrying mosquitoes
- Checked freshwater wetlands for mosquito larvae and treat when needed with Bti
- Prepared for the upcoming trapping of adult mosquitoes for disease testing
- Trapped, processed and identified adult mosquitoes

During a heat wave, many jobs become more difficult. Municipal mosquito control is one of them. Dragon crews survived the hottest heat wave on record while treating mosquito larvae on the salt marshes. It's punishing to carry a 50 pound backpack while wearing protective gear when it's 95+ degrees. Heat speeds mosquito development while it slows us down making our work even more challenging.

Many catch basins retain water and produce abundant mosquitoes making them a focus during the summer months. Catch basin mosquitoes have tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV) and Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) through the years in NH. Catch basins are treated with an organic insecticide that kills the larvae.

Trapping of adult mosquitoes for disease testing is underway. Traps are set weekly in numerous locations throughout your community. Trap catches are collected, and sorted, specimens are identified and select species are sent to the State Lab in Concord where they are tested for disease. As well as submitting mosquitoes for disease testing, data collected from trapping is an essential part of Dragon's integrated mosquito management program and guides our treatment decisions.

The NH Department of Health and Human Services announced that mosquitoes collected in Bow, Dumbarton and Canterbury have tested positive for Jamestown Canyon Virus (JCV). There have been over a dozen human cases of JCV in NH since 2013. This is the first time mosquitoes are being tested for JCV. The pilot program intends to estimate the prevalence of JCV in mosquitoes throughout Central New Hampshire. Testing mosquitoes for Eastern Equine Encephalitis and West Nile Virus begins in July. The State will issue a press release when EEE and WNV are first detected in mosquitoes. NHEC Broadband Update

July 14, 2021

We wanted to provide you with an update on New Hampshire Electric Cooperative's (NHEC) efforts to ensure that all our members in the 118 communities we serve have access to affordable, high speed internet service.


Last year, the State awarded NHEC \$6.7 million in federal CARES Act funding to extend broadband service to our members. This funding enabled NHEC to build 100 miles of fiber to 1,000 homes and businesses (shown in blue on the map) in 100 days. We completed the project on time and on budget, a major achievement that demonstrated NHEC's commitment to expanding high speed internet access to unserved and underserved populations and, equally important, our ability to deliver on that commitment.

Now, with the significant additional funding that will be available in New Hampshire under the American Rescue Plan (ARPA), we have an exciting opportunity to work together with municipalities and counties to achieve much more for rural New Hampshire.

NHEC has been actively working to develop a strategic partnership that will help bring high speed internet to all 70,000 of our member homes and businesses sooner than if this effort were undertaken on a patchwork basis by multiple local and county groups. NHEC's plan is to make service available at approximately 20,000 currently unserved and underserved locations in our service territory, estimated to be in excess of half of New Hampshire's total unserved and underserved population. Building fiber to reach these 20,000 "last mile" addresses would also make it possible to reach the remaining 50,000 of NHEC's member homes and businesses, many of whom currently have substandard service. The full system buildout would deploy 3,400 miles of fiber (shown in red on the map) and could be completed by the ARPA deadline of December 2024.

To accomplish this, NHEC is aggressively pursuing public and private partnership funding, including available ARPA funds, and is willing to commit substantial funds of its own. While we do not yet have final cost figures, we estimate the full cost of this plan could exceed \$150 million.

Working with you, we are confident we can transform the landscape for New Hampshire families and businesses who are in desperate need of access to reliable, high-speed internet. We have already reached out to the State, to let them know our plans and our ability to implement them, and to express our belief that a unified, more comprehensive approach to grant funding will best serve New Hampshire.



The key to success is building a strong coalition among interested municipalities and counties and non-profit parties like NHEC. By combining the resources of State, county and municipal ARPA funding, along with NHEC's low cost capital, we can ensure that thousands of unserved and underserved locations in 118 rural communities can be connected to reliable and fast internet service.

As you know, communities will be the direct recipients of ARPA Local Fiscal Recovery funds in the amount stated on the <u>Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery (GOFERR)</u> website. The GOFERR website also provides information on how towns can apply to get those funds, starting on June 18. Many towns have already committed their ARPA funding to support broadband expansion in their areas, and counties are considering using substantial portions of their ARPA funds for broadband. We invite you to join this coalition by allocating some or all of your ARPA grant funds to support broadband expansion, and encouraging your county to do the same. Working together, we can get this done.

This is an exciting time for NHEC and for the towns and cities in our service area. We look forward to partnering with you as we build out high speed broadband service to meet the needs of our families and businesses.

During this time, eligible entities can submit funding requests to the FCC to cover the cost of eligible services, equipment, and devices between July 1, 2021 and June 30, 2022. Applicants must specify if they will submit invoices or if their service provider has agreed to submit invoices on their behalf. The Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) is the administrator of the ECF program and will review applications and issue funding commitment decision letters (FCDL) for approved organizations. After receiving an FCDL, approved organizations may submit reimbursement requests to USAC. A second filing window may be opened for prospective or retrospective purchases if not all funds are used within the first filing window. Dragon Mosquito Control, Inc. Monthly Update June 2021

One year ago, we were experiencing a moderate drought. Today, we're currently in better shape. Lawns are green, gardens are growing and backyard containers are full of water, which is perfect for mosquitoes. Continue to dump out standing water in your yard to reduce mosquito numbers and the risk of mosquito-borne illnesses.

In June, Dragon crews have:

- Monitored catch basins for larval mosquito activity
- Treated catch basins with an organic insecticide to control disease carrying mosquitoes
- Checked freshwater wetlands for mosquito larvae and treat when needed with Bti
- Prepared for the upcoming trapping of adult mosquitoes for disease testing
- Trapped, processed and identified adult mosquitoes

During a heat wave, many jobs become more difficult. Municipal mosquito control is one of them. Dragon crews survived the hottest heat wave on record while treating mosquito larvae on the salt marshes. It's punishing to carry a 50 pound backpack while wearing protective gear when it's 95+ degrees. Heat speeds mosquito development while it slows us down making our work even more challenging.

Many catch basins retain water and produce abundant mosquitoes making them a focus during the summer months. Catch basin mosquitoes have tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV) and Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) through the years in NH. Catch basins are treated with an organic insecticide that kills the larvae.

Trapping of adult mosquitoes for disease testing is underway. Traps are set weekly in numerous locations throughout your community. Trap catches are collected, and sorted, specimens are identified and select species are sent to the State Lab in Concord where they are tested for disease. As well as submitting mosquitoes for disease testing, data collected from trapping is an essential part of Dragon's integrated mosquito management program and guides our treatment decisions.

The NH Department of Health and Human Services announced that mosquitoes collected in Bow, Dumbarton and Canterbury have tested positive for Jamestown Canyon Virus (JCV). There have been over a dozen human cases of JCV in NH since 2013. This is the first time mosquitoes are being tested for JCV. The pilot program intends to estimate the prevalence of JCV in mosquitoes throughout Central New Hampshire. Testing mosquitoes for Eastern Equine Encephalitis and West Nile Virus begins in July. The State will issue a press release when EEE and WNV are first detected in mosquitoes. After the aeration media cleaning process, we found that the existing aeration media could not be reused to adequately put the system back on line. After several call top the manufacturer, it was determined that the aeration media will need to be replaced.

They do a deep purge of all existing programs and then reinstall the basics on functioning computers for email or network searches. The unsalvageable units are used for parts. Once a unit is complete, it is given to a vet in need.

- Large events and/or road closures <u>will</u> need Emergency Management Working Group and may need selectmen approval.
- Following the application review, the applicant will be notified of approval or disapproval and any additional conditions.

Facility Use Guidelines

The Town of Raymond reserves the right to implement policies, rules and regulations for the use of Town facilities in order to promote the overall safety of patrons, as well as to safeguard and protect these parks & facilities. The Town of Raymond reserves the right to suspend usage and scheduling privileges if any applicant/organization fails to comply with Town policies, and site specific rules and regulations, and all legal requirements.

- The applicant/organization will be held responsible for all actions, behavior and conduct of all patrons, guests, and members associated with the event.

The following items are prohibited:

SUBJECT: Acceptance of Overlook Drive

Mr. Bruce Delle Chiaie, the developer of Overlook Drive is seeking to have this road accepted by the Board of Selectmen.

The road has been constructed to the Town standards and overseen by the Planning Board's engineer at intervals of the construction. Most recently they have reviewed the As-Built Plan which was submitted as a requirement of the Planning Board approval.

It is my recommendation that this road be accepted at the meeting of the Board on July 26, 2021 with the following conditions:

- 1. That the Deed conveying the road Right of Way be recorded in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds.
- 2. That upon said recording, a stamped letter from the Land Surveyor document that all property bounds and iron rods have been set.
- 3. That upon said recording and receipt of the letter noted above, the Bond be relinquished.

It should be noted here that upon the acceptance of the road, the Town of Raymond Department of Public Works will assume responsibility for the road infrastructure within the limits of the Right of Way.

The individual driveway facilities will continue to be the responsibility of the individual property owners.

The drainage facilities that lie outside the Right of Way, such as the detention pond, forebay and pipes leading to it will be the continued responsibility of the Homeowners Association. The Association will also have the long term responsible for the mailbox kiosk facility and the fire protection cistern.

In closing, we do recommend that the manhole access lid that is currently buried under 3 feet of soil, be raised to the level of the gravel road to facilitate access should the Homeowners Associate need to access this structure.

Upon full acceptance we will advise Waste Management that this is now a Town road and they will commence curbside collection on this road.
